

Punctuation: Semi-Colon (;)

The semicolon signals more of a pause than the comma alone but not quite the full pause of a period. Use a semicolon to do the following:

1. Join two complete thoughts that are not already connected by a joining word such as *and*, *but*, *for*, or *so*.

The chemistry lab blew up; Professor Thomas was fired.

I once stabbed myself with a pencil; a black mark has been under my skin ever since.

2. Join two complete thoughts that include a transitional word such as *however*, *otherwise*, *moreover*, *furthermore*, *therefore*, or *consequently*.

I cut and raked the grass; moreover, I weeded the lawn.

Sally finished typing the paper; however, she forgot to bring it to class.
