What Does PBS Look Like at Mount Nittany Elementary?

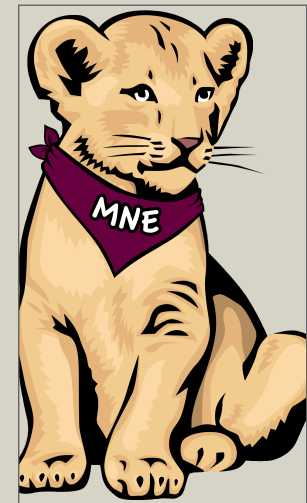
1. Expectations are displayed throughout the school.

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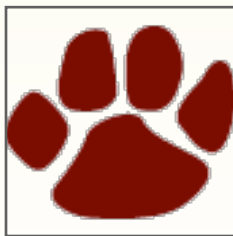
School Wide Positive Behavior Support

What is School Wide Positive Behavior Support?

Positive Behavior Support is a different way of handling discipline. In a school setting, it cannot be assumed that students know correct behaviors. Children come from different backgrounds and cultures that view behavior in their own unique ways. When a child misbehaves, the school views it as a skill deficit. Therefore, students are taught appropriate behaviors and expectations. Students are rewarded when they display expected behavior.

Consequences are still given for inappropriate behavior. These consequences may include:

- Conference with the student
- Warning issued
- Parent contacted
- Time in office
- Lunch in office
- Student/Teacher Conference
- Loss of privilege
- Out of school suspension
